

Adolfo G. Cuevas, Ph.D., is Assistant Professor in the Department of Social and Behavioral Sciences at NYU's School of Global Public Health and Deputy Director of the Center for Anti-racism, Social Justice, & Public Health. As a community psychologist, he uses a wide range of population-level datasets and advanced statistical methods to establish a plausible understanding of how discrimination "get under the skin" to increase the risk of aging-related diseases. Dr. Cuevas' work has been published in scientific journals, such as Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences and Annals of Internal Medicine and featured in HuffPost and NPR's Code Switch. He is currently spearheading three NIH-funded project aimed at examining the impact of both neighborhood and interpersonal discrimination on biological dysregulation throughout the life course. Prior to joining NYU, he was the Gerald R. Gill Assistant Professor of Race, Culture, and Society at Tufts University. He earned his PhD and MS in applied psychology from Portland State University and completed postdoctoral training at the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health.
