

Councilor Miniard Culpepper is a lifelong Dorchester resident, pastor, attorney, and community advocate who proudly represents District 7 on the Boston City Council.

Born and raised on Seaver Street, Miniard grew up surrounded by a legacy of faith and activism. His grandparents were the first Black family on their block, and his grandfather—a pastor and NAACP leader—marched with Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and helped create one of Boston's first Black-owned nursery schools. That legacy taught Miniard that faith must be paired with action.

A graduate of English High School, Brandeis University, Howard Divinity School, and Suffolk University Law School, Miniard has spent his life fighting for housing justice, civil rights, and opportunity. As a senior attorney at HUD, he helped rebuild public housing, fought discrimination, and secured critical federal investment for Boston neighborhoods.

As Senior Pastor of Pleasant Hill Missionary Baptist Church, Miniard founded youth mentorship and peace programs, led violence prevention efforts, and mobilized neighbors during the pandemic to provide food and vaccines.

On the City Council, Miniard is committed to keeping District 7 affordable, safe, and inclusive—ensuring that longtime residents can remain, young people can succeed, and every neighborhood has a voice in shaping Boston's future.
